Important information on Parking:

While there are options below for parking, parking is extremely limited and it would be preferable to avail of the park and ride, if not public transport on the day of the conference.

Visitor Parking & Deliveries

The two main visitor car parks are located at:

- Perrott's Inch (P1, off Western Road)
- College Road (P2, entry from Perrott Avenue)

Both car parks are charged for by the hour.

Visitor parking is also available at:

- Western Gateway Building
- Brookfield Health Science Complex
- North Mall Campus

Pay and Display tickets here are €2 per hour.

Please note that access to all other on campus car parks is restricted to permit holders Monday to Friday, 8am–5pm.

€2 Charge on Exit after 7pm

There is a €2 charge on exit after 7pm from the main campus, Geography Car Park, Aras na Laoi Car Park and Food Science Car Park. The North Mall car park is charged at €2 from 5pm on entry for operational reasons.

Note: Swipe key holders can swipe out as usual from these car parks, the €2 charge on exit after 7pm does not apply.


